Week 4 focuses on You are the Help Until Help Arrives.

5 Key Actions to Take in An Emergency

Call 9-1-1

- Provide the dispatcher with your location and the nature of the emergency.
- Follow any instructions given by the dispatcher.
- Certain VTA employees are trained in First Aid and CPR. If an emergency occurs, first ensure safety of the surroundings, then have another employee promptly notify an Emergency Response Team member for assistance.







Stay Safe

- Ensure your safety first before helping others.
- Move away from any immediate dangers.

Stop the Bleeding

- Apply steady, firm pressure on the source of bleeding until first responders arrive.
- Use a tourniquet if trained and if the bleeding is lifethreatening.

Position the Injured

- Keep the injured person warm and comfortable.
- Position them so they can breathe easily, usually on their side if unconscious.



Provide Comfort

- Offer reassurance and stay with the person until professional
- Keep them calm and informed about what is happening.
